The issue of debt and how it

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composer's music. The text is lavishly illustrated with plates that reveal both the diversity of his operatic development and comprise a distinctive pictorial bibliography.

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considered the key modern philosopher and critic of modern art. Tracing his influence on modern aesthetics and cultural history, Introducing Walter Benjamin highlights his commitment to

For a brief time at the start of the 20th century, Florida was

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poised to be the film making Mecca of North America. Jacksonville had suffered a devastating fire and the rebuilt community enjoyed a wealth of architectural styles that allowed films set in exotic

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locations such as Egypt, Italy or Polynesia - all for the cost of shipping the cast and equipment on the train from wintery New York. But racial tensions, religious concerns and epidemics drove the

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Chainsaw Massacre, to the less influential but memorable (for all the wrong reasons) Blood Freak with its pro-Christian, anti-drug message starring a mutant turkey vampire motorcyclist. Switching from

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film to print, the Floridian horror story reflects an intrinsic Floridian compulsion to bulldoze the past beneath a new shiny future. But beneath that overpriced facade of new construction is the Florida of

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old, the one the mouse-bound tourists conveniently overlook, a hellish landscape of swamps that range from brackish to ftid, flora and fauna that range from deadly to carnivorous and locals that range from surly to

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anthropophagous. So be careful about which star you wish upon, and phrase that wish very carefully. You never know if a were-turkey biker, a giant leech or a mutant gator will answer it. "Tourists think

Exploring the connections between Walter Benjamin's

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philosophy of history and a Marxian Critique of Political Economy, Duy Lap Nguyen analyses Benjamin's early writings and their development into a distinct understanding of historical materialism.

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Benjamin's historically materialist conception of history is shown to be characterised by a focus on the religion of capitalism, the mythology of the state, and messianic time. Revealing

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these factors, Nguyen joins up Benjamin's philosophical critique of the Kantian conception of history, alongside the historical trajectory of capitalism he subscribed to. Influenced by

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the theory of fascism outlined by German Marxist theorist Karl Korsch, we see how Benjamin's own theory of revolution and redemption in capitalist society developed into a sophisticated critique.

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Essential to Benjamin's materialist critique was a recognition of the fallibility of the Enlightenment notion of progress, as well as the need to overturn the political and economic catastrophes which

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enable capitalism and fascism to thrive. In mapping the exact course of Benjamin's critical historical materialism, Nguyen fully explicates the unique contribution he made to western Marxism.

Animal Parasites

This book provides a highly original

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approach to the writings of the twentieth-century German philosopher Walter Benjamin by one of his most distinguished readers. It develops the idea of 'working with' Benjamin, seeking both to read his corpus and to put it to work - to show how a reading of Benjamin can open up issues that may not themselves be immediately at

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stake in his texts. The defining elements in Benjamin's writings that Andrew Benjamin isolates - history, experience, translation, technical reproducibility and politics - are put to work; that is, their utility is established in engaging the works of others. The question is how utility is understood. As Andrew Benjamin argues,

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utility involves demonstrating the different ways in which Benjamin is a central thinker within the project of understanding the nature of modernity. This is best achieved by noting connections and points of differentiation between his work and the writings of Adorno and Heidegger. However, the more demanding project is

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that 'working with' Benjamin necessitates deploying the implicit assumptions within his writings as well as demanding of his formulations more than is provided by their initial presentation. What is at stake is not the application of Benjamin's thought. Rather what counts is its use. Working with Benjamin engages with the themes central

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to Benjamin's work with deftness, daring and critical insight while at the same time situating those themes within current academic and cultural debates.

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`objects themselves; the unexpected potentialities such objects harbour. In his sensitivity to what he calls `the particularity of material events; Benjamin;s writing comes

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to exemplify new possibilities for the contemporary practice of criticism itself. These essays are a major contribution to critical thought about art and

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architecture today, and a genuine work of what Benjamin himself identifies as a `materialist aesthetics;. This book explores, discusses, and assesses

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the actual and potential sense of subjectivation in a variety of contexts. In particular, it reflects the genealogies, connections, variations, and practical implications

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of various theories of subjectivity and subjection while providing an up-to-date and authoritative account of how to engage with the 'subject'. Rather than

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addressing the 'subject' merely in theoretical terms, this book explores subjectivation as a seminal expression of subjective practices in the plural. To the extent

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that subjectivity and
subjection are key terms
in a plurality of
discourses and for a
number of disciplines,
Subjectivation in
Political Theory and

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Contemporary Practices
advances a trans-
disciplinary reading by
taking into account
relevant debates that
stretch from
poststructuralism via

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postfordism to
postdemocracy. In this
sense, the book introduces
readers to current
approaches to
subjectivation by
displacing conventional

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understandings and suggesting unexpected reformulations.
