

Clueless: New Research Uncovers The Story Of Two Extraordinary Financial Mysteries, Massive Investor Losses, And A Brilliantly Straightforward Blueprint To Achieve Huge Profits From Investment Funds

The five stages of grief are so deeply imbedded in our culture that no American can escape them. Every time we experience loss—a personal or national one—we hear them recited: denial, anger, bargaining, depression, and acceptance. The stages are invoked to explain everything from how we will recover from the death of a loved one to a sudden environmental catastrophe or to the trading away of a basketball star. But the stunning fact is that there is no validity to the stages that were proposed by psychiatrist Elisabeth Kübler-Ross more than forty years ago. In *The Truth About Grief*, Ruth Davis Konigsberg shows how the five stages were based on no science but nonetheless became national myth. She explains that current research paints a completely different picture of how we actually grieve. It turns out people are pretty well programmed to get over loss. Grieving should not be a strictly regimented process, she argues; nor is the best remedy for pain always to examine it or express it at great length. The strength of Konigsberg’s message is its liberating force: there is no manual to grieving; you can do it freestyle. In the course of clarifying our picture of grief, Konigsberg tells its history, revealing how social and cultural forces have shaped our approach to loss from the Gettysburg Address through 9/11. She examines how the American version of grief has spread to the rest of the world and contrasts it with the interpretations of other cultures—like the Chinese, who focus more on their bond with the deceased than on the emotional impact of bereavement. Konigsberg also offers a close look at Kübler-Ross herself: who she borrowed from to come up with her theory, and how she went from being a pioneering psychiatrist to a New Age healer who sought the guidance of two spirits named Salem and Pedro and declared that death did not exist. Deeply researched and provocative, *The Truth About Grief* draws on history, culture, and science to upend our country’s most entrenched beliefs about its most common experience.

It is a mistake to think that was only concern armies involved in active engagement. Nothing is farther from the truth. The real forces of evil wage a financial war. As *If!* illuminates why plaid skirts and knee socks will never go out of style, and why *Clueless* remains one of the most beloved comedies of all time.

The intellectual fury and political bristone ricocheting internationally from the evolution firestorm raging in Kansas and Oklahoma offers a convenient platform for *Ride To Glory*’s debut -- a rock-em, sock-em intellectual attack exposing the glaring myths of evolution. While Johns doesn’t claim to settle the creation/evolution controversy, he contributes refreshing, state-of-the-art insight and comes down firmly within the camp of those committed to Intelligent Design and the miracle of God’s creation. “*Ride To Glory*” exposes some of Charles Darwin’s more shaky suppositions in a fictional courtroom battle. Billed as *Monkey II*, the mock trial picks up where the 1925 *Scopes “trial of the century”* left off, debating the millenniums hot-button issue: “Is Evolution a Fact?”. Gutsy Ph.D. candidate and independent thinker, Joshua Chamberlain Ryan, is cast as “star” witness inadvertently pitting him against major Professor Karl Stryker, devout defender of Darwinian doctrine. Josh thumbs his nose at Darwin’s speculations and puts his academic credentials on the line, irreverently bashing evolution’s Achilles’ heels with the courage of the biblical Joshua attacking Jericho. The storyline boasts an intellectual zest fortified with bibliography and endnotes packed with solid reference data that reinforce the obstreperous on-stage testimony. In a plot wired for unexpected twists and turns, Charles Robert Darwin’s conjectures wind up with the bottom-line short straw.

The sisters lived together in New York City, none of them married or had children, and one even had an affair with J. P. Morgan. John Belushi was found dead of a drug overdose March 5, 1982, in a seedy hotel bungalow off Sunset Boulevard in Hollywood. PFOA is often called a “forever chemical,” because once in the environment, it does not break down or degrade for millions of years, contaminating the planet forever. The case of one farmer soon spawns a class action suit on behalf of seventy thousand residents—and the shocking realization that virtually every person on the planet has been exposed to PFOA and carries the chemical in his or her blood.
