This narrative biography describes more of the details of the young Laura's real life as a young pioneer homesteading with her family on many adventurous journeys. This biography, complete with charming illustrations, points out the differences between the fictional series as well as the many similarities. Yona Zeldis McDonough's *Little Author in the Big Woods* is a fascinating story of a much-celebrated writer.
