In the 21st century photography has come of age as a contemporary art form. Almost two centuries after photographic technology was first invented, the art world has fully embraced it as a legitimate and equal in status to painting and sculpture. Volume IV of *The Early Journals and Letters of Fanny Burney*, covering the years 1780-1781, is of particular interest to students of Burney as it marks the young author's introduction into the literary world following the astonishing success of her novel *Evelina* (1778) and includes her visits to Streatley, her encounters with Hester and Henry Thrale and Dr Johnson. It was an exciting period in her life in which she managed to enjoy despite struggling to repeat her first success while avoiding the unwelcome attention it brought. But it was also a difficult period in her family life as she dealt with jealous interference by her stepmother, the courtship of her sister Susan by a man she considered untrustworthy, and the misbehaviour of her brothers. Burney's enthusiasm makes the most of her experiences and she describes characters and scenes with all the genius displayed in her novels. Her descriptions contain the four great attributes that distinguish her novels: brilliant handling of dialogue, total and full recall of conversations characteristic of the speaker, sensibility and empathy for her characters, and great relish for the ridiculous wherever it occurred.

The result, however, the family of her intended husband breaks their marriage agreement. And as a result, at adolescence, Ailin finds that her family is no longer willing to support her. Chinese society leaves few options for a single woman of good family, but with a bold conviction and an indomitable spirit, Ailin is determined to forge her own destiny. Her story is a tribute to all those women whose courage has paved the way for new options for the generations who came after them.
