In January of 1956, five young evangelical missionaries were spared to death by a band of the Waorani people in the Ecuadorian Amazon. Sexually assaulted, compelled into an arranged polygamous marriage, locked away in “houses of hiding” as punishment for perceived transgressions, and physically separated from her children, Rachel, Jeffs’ first plural daughter by his second of more than fifty wives, eventually found the courage to leave the church in 2015.
