Criminal Recidivism intends to fill a gap in the criminological psychology literature by examining the processes underlying persistent criminal careers. Attachment theory is a concept well known to

‘ mainstream ’ psychologists, informing the literature in areas as diverse as psychodynamics, developmental psychology, social psychology and counselling. This important new book is the first to demonstrate the relevance of attachment theory to the psychology of sport, exercise and wellness, opening up important new avenues for research and professional practice. In this book, author Sam Carr explains that attachment theory can help us to better understand well established themes and processes in sport and exercise, including motivation, social relationships, cognitive models of coping, and group processes. By introducing the core elements of attachment theory and mapping out those areas in which it can inform the knowledge and practice of psychologists working in sport, exercise and wellness, this book represents an innovative and important contribution to the psychological literature. Two hundred ninety-three college students responded to a measure designed to examine retrospective accounts of the physical affection received during early childhood. The study looked exclusively from the perspective of the adolescent. Assessing the importance of touch in human development, and the

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role it plays in adult attachment and the ability to form and maintain close and intimate relations with others was the purpose of the study. Six separate measures were used to assess the role of touch in adolescent development: three items from Gupta and Schork to assess physical affection (touch); Simpson's attachment style measure; Gerlsma, Arrindell, Van der Veen, and Emmelkamp's parental warmth measure; and Rosenthal, Gurney, and Moore's Erikson Psychosocial Inventory Scale to assess intimacy. Also, one-item measures to assess trust and parents' marital satisfaction were all utilized in this study. Results confirmed statistically significant relationships between parental warmth and touch, warmth and attachment, and intimacy and attachment. Related literature supported the findings of the study and point to the importance of parental warmth and touch in early childhood for competent social and emotional development during adolescence. Implications of the results and possible areas of future research are discussed.

The contributors come from Canada, England, Italy, United States, Hong Kong and New Zealand where they are researchers at major universities. The papers are organized into four sections: 1) Context of Families, 2) Family Adjustment and Transitions, 3) Child and Adolescent Development, and Attachment. The book sets out to bring together advanced research by psychologists, social workers, physicians, sociologists and other social scientists on the interface between society, the family, children, adolescents and other family members.

While there has been considerable research into adolescent attachment in Western contexts little is known about this important relationship construct and its impact on adolescent adjustment in Asian settings. This thesis explores the attachment relationships of adolescents and their association with psychological health and adjustment in Malaysian culture. Specifically,

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relationship specific attachments (maternal, paternal and peer) and their influences on adolescent self-esteem and depression are examined. Three studies were conducted involving two samples of school-going adolescents (13 to 17 years) randomly selected from urban and rural areas across Malaysia. Using data from the first sample (N=2040), Study 1 and 2 explore the psychometric properties of the Inventory of Parent and Peer Attachment (IPPA) and evaluate a structural, mediational model of the relationships between maternal, paternal, and peer attachment and self-esteem and depression. The second sample (N=973) participated in Study 3, which explores the psychometric properties of an alternative measure of adolescent attachment relationships, the Domains of Adolescent Attachment Scale (DAAS), and evaluates a mediational model of attachment relationships and psychological health. The results of the first two studies reveal that the standard structure of the IPPA was not applicable in Malaysian adolescents. Contrary to Western findings, this study found that a different three-factor structure for the parental scales and two-factor structure for the Peer scale best fit the Malaysian data. Based on a new factor structure of the IPPA, a model of attachment relationships, self-esteem and depression was evaluated. Analysis with structural equation modeling (SEM) indicated that major adjustments were required to the proposed model. An alternative measurement model was developed and evaluated which focused on common factors rather than attachment to specific figures. This measurement model resulted in an

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acceptable goodness-of-fit for the overall model. Findings suggest that adolescents with secure attachment relationships are psychologically healthier and that self-esteem mediates the relationship between attachment and depression. However, some paths in the model varied across age and gender with the influence of attachment relationships on self-esteem and depression appearing stronger for females and younger adolescents. Study 3 found that the DAAS had a similar factor structure to the original scale evaluated on Australian adolescents, after deleting several items from the Paternal, Maternal and Best Friend scales. SEM supported a mediational model that remained stable across age and gender of adolescents. Consistent with expectations, adolescents with secure parental attachment relationships reported higher self-esteem and fewer depressive symptoms. Interestingly, father attachment was found to have a larger influence on adolescents' psychological health than mother attachment. Contrary to expectations, best friend attachment did not show any significant influence on adolescents' psychological health. The thesis highlights the importance of secure attachment relationships for the psychological health and adjustment of Malaysian adolescents. Further, the findings implicate the important role that cultural factors may have in adolescent attachment representations. It is argued that future research should consider cultural factors when assessing attachment, particularly adolescent attachment, as findings generated in Western settings may not always translate directly to Asian contexts.

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This book provides a broad overview of the literature, theory, and clinical treatment of attachment deficit. It discusses its application in understanding the etiology of juvenile sexual offending, as well as implications for treatment.
