But in between there were plenty of good times--the Model T cars that Henry Ford made were cheap enough for the masses, the new sound of jazz heated up speakeasies and nightclubs during the time of Prohibition. Women, recently given the right to vote, cut their long hair into bobs, wore short skirts and makeup, and danced the Charleston (sometimes in marathons that lasted days). Michele Mortlock hits all the highlights of this heady age that still feels modern even a hundred years later.

With a mid performance break for refreshments it's a pleasant way to pass an evening and even raise some funds! * You will need a cast of twelve players (NO ACTING ABILITY is needed) and one of the twelve to be the MC to steer events and guide the audience. The twelve (apart from the MC) are all SUSPECTS in a murder investigation. * Each character is given his or her 'part' but not those of other actors. There are NO LINES TO LEARN. The part is a complete description of where the character was when the murder took place and lots of suggestions and clues so that he or she can throw suspicion on the others and clear himself. The character is NOT ALLOWED TO TELL LIES. *ONLY the actual murderer CAN LIE and this is how the audience become suspicious. Only the murderer knows that he or she is the murderer. The other actors don't. So don't pass the complete script around. * FUN! It's fun dressing up and speaking with different accents. * A MURDER MYSTERY evening will draw your group together and improve group interaction. Strictly speaking no rehearsal is necessary IF EACH PLAYER is prepared to master his CHARACTER (not his lines) and dress and speak in the role. It goes better with a rehearsal because it improves the performers confidence. * It's a game of two halves! The first half is the performance, the second is the audience voting. The MC describes the crime and then the other eleven say their pieces. No scenery is necessary but that's up to you! Improvise! One of the most dynamic eras in American history—the 1920s—began with this watershed year that would set the tone for the century to follow. “The Roaring Twenties” is the only decade in American history with a widely applied nickname, and our collective fascination with this era continues. But how did this surge of innovation and cultural milestones emerge out of the ashes of The Great War? No one has yet written a book about the decade’s beginning. This is an exhilarating portrait of the era of invention, glamour and excess from one of the brightest young stars of mainstream history writing. Bracketed by the catastrophes of the Great War and the Wall Street Crash, the 1920s was a time of fear and glittered with seduction: jazz, flappers, wild all-night parties, the birth of Hollywood, and a glamorous gangster-led crime scene forced to flourish under prohibition. It was punctuated by terrifying events - the political show trials of Sacco and Vanzetti; the h Washington DC's Pennsylvania Avenue by the Ku Klux Klan - and produced a glittering array of artists, musicians and film stars, from F. Scott Fitzgerald to Bessie Smith to Charlie Chaplin. Here, Lucy Moore interweaves the most compelling stories of the people who characterized the decade to produce a gripping account of an often-overlooked period. In doing so, she demonstrates that the jazz age was far more than just 'between wars': it was an epoch of passion and change - an age, she observes, that was not unlike what she evokes is one of effortless allure and terrifying drama: a world that was desperate to escape itself.

Last year I researched, wrote and published a trilogy dealing with each of the 20th century's final three decades. My chief advantages for covering that period: real-life experiences and memories associated with events. That privilege does not apply to the late father's recollections (he had been born in 1928) concentrated on the deprivations of the 1930s and the Second World War. My paternal grandfather, who had been in his twenties then and passed away in 1984, was a blue-collar man of few words. He listened to sailors' songs. My maternal grandfather, on the other hand, did jot down some recollections at my prompting during the 1980s (he died in 1994). In the 1920s he had been a farmer; he had found the agricultural property in Schopheim near the father's behest. Writing in 1984, Grandfather Moser mentioned that 1923 had been the worst year: "We became millionaires and billionaires, but were also the poorest. In the end, the authorities suspended the printing of banknotes; instead, they used a standard long digits. Cities and towns resorted to issuing their own currency." In addition to his recollections, grainy movies and analog recordings have served as reminders of a tumultuous time. The popular television series Downton Abbey recalls the period from Britain's landed aristocracy and their servants. Most inspiring, however, turned out to be the German-language Netflix series, Babylon Berlin. It vividly recreates the deteriorating socioeconomic and political conditions of the Weimar Republic in 1929. The event I recalled some of the experiences of a century earlier: a global pandemic, economic shutdowns and political polarization as well as agitation. Even though many volumes have been written about the decade, I concluded that something worthwhile might come from a fresh look from a civil rights perspective detailing behind-the-scenes developments of an era famous for its vitality and gusto. As far as possible I incorporated the latest research and insights. In North America, the decade has frequently been referred to as the Twenties" or the "Jazz Age", while Europeans occasionally label it the "Golden Age Twenties," due to the economic boom that lasted until 1929. French speakers call it "Les années folles" (the crazy years), emphasizing the era's social, artistic, and cultural dynamism. The decade was a meagre existence under the yoke of colonialism remained less enthusiastic. To them, the period remained part of the subjugation and humiliation that eventually would precipitate a wave of independence movements. One of the most blatant examples was the British Hong Kong's public parks that read: "Dogs and Chinese not allowed." The decade began with much soul searching about what had culminated in the War to End all Wars. Military machinery, set in motion by decaying empires trying to keep progress at bay, many of Europe's young. Those ordering them to the fields and trenches had escaped punishment by abdicating (such as Kaiser Wilhelm II) or dying (Emperor Franz Joseph of Austria-Hungary and the Ottoman Sultan Mehmed V). The republican governments that replaced them often included prominent members from the landed nobles who had commanded army units - even among Lenin's Bolshevik hard core. Hence, renewal of the political class remained slow and delayed. The book consists of four parts and an interlude: he interlude on Canada and recreation, movers and shakers, and seeds of destruction. A concluding section answers the question whether the decade represented "The Good Old Times."

Sometime the roles were reversed or shaken up. But nobody could be indifferent for long. Inspiration, provocation, myth, menace, model: all these categories and many more have been deployed to try to cope with the Americans. Attitudes and stereotypes have emerged, intellectual resources have been mobilised, positions and policies developed; all trying to explain and deal with the kind of radiant modernity America built over the course of the twentieth century. David Ellwood combines political, economic, and cultural themes, suggesting that American mass culture has provided the United States with a uniquely effective link between power and influence over time. The book is structured in three parts; a separation based on the proposition that America's influence as an unavoidable force for or against innovation was visible most conspicuously after Europe's three greatest military-political conflicts of the contemporary era: the Great War, World War II, and the Cold War. It concludes with the emotional upsurge in Europe which greeted the arrival of Obama on the world scene, suggesting that in spite of all the disappointments and frictions of the years, the US still retained its privileged place as a source of inspiration for the future across the Western world.

What is love? How, and why, does it last? Through the decades of the twentieth century, advancements were made in almost every field of human endeavor, including medicine, science, and technology. However, despite continual progress, couples seem to know less than ever how to stay together.

Times change, as does clothing; slang comes and goes; music mutates and annoys every generation's parents; yet people still meet, fall in love and begin lives together, no matter what goes on around them. As a decade, a century, and a millennium simultaneously ended, news stories, books, documentaries, and prime-time features were produced on the advancements we have seen as a nation and as a planet. Yet despite new knowledge and vast changes in our culture, through wars that have been fought and every eventual peace that has ever been established, strangers still meet under the most unimaginable circumstances, and suddenly are strangers no longer. Despite answers that have been found to every imaginable mystery, writers, poets, artists, filmmakers, as well as ordinary men and women, still encounter the most basic human mystery in the simple question: What is love? This book is an attempt to find an answer. But it wasn't my original intent. Is it possible that there might be a secret, some elusive grail, to making a relationship work? Are there common truths that span generations? How do people create a life together that lasts, that defies statistics, and keep from becoming boring, or simply somnambulant? People love telling the story of how they met. And everyone loves hearing these tales of early beginnings. That is where the original idea for this book came from. A collection of "how we met" stories. But as I began asking people to share, I realized that I was recording tales that also reflected the times in which they happened. I soon envisioned a collection that spanned the decades of the century, and that mirrored the cultural changes of the times. Starting with the twenties, included here are tales told with the background of immigrants flooding the streets, of economic depression, of war, of the birth of rock and roll, of the turbulence of the sixties, the confusion of the seventies, the increasing security of the eighties, and the technological nineties. Here are fun, silly, romantic, serious, exciting, and loving tales of people I have grown to know. In these pages you will read of couples who met in the excitement of the roaring twenties (New York, 1927), during the depth of the depression (Kansas, 1939), amidst the chaos and ruins of World War II (France, 1948), in the giddy post-war recovery (San Jose, 1954), the tumultuousness of the sixties (Boulder, 1968), the wildness of the seventies (Ann Arbor, 1974). You will read of couples who met in line waiting for a table at a restaurant (1940), on blind dates (1946, 1955, 1992), at a singles group (1975), a summer teen retreat (1977), on a massage table (1980), during a blizzard on a volcano (1982), on the Great Peace March (1986), on an Indian Reservation (1989), and those who met via the personal ads (1986) and cyberspace (1999). During my interviews, I asked all the couples two questions. First, was it love at first sight? The conventional wisdom on how technology will change the future is wrong. Mark Mills lays out a radically different and optimistic vision for what's really coming. Accelerating and enabling all of this is the Cloud, history's biggest infrastructure, which is itself based on the building blocks of next-generation microprocessors and artificial intelligence. We've seen this pattern before. The technological revolution that drove the great economic expansion of the twentieth century can be traced to a similar confluence, one that was first visible in the 1920s: a new information infrastructure (telephony), new machines (cars and power plants), and new materials (plastics and pharmaceuticals). Single inventions don't drive great, long-cycle booms. It always takes convergent revolutions in technology's three core spheres—information, materials, and machines. Over history, that's only happened a few times. We have wrung much magic from the technologies that fueled the last long boom. But the great convergence now underway will ignite the 2020s. And this time, unlike any previous historical epoch, we have the Cloud amplifying everything. The next long boom starts now.
