While describing the tremendous technological accomplishment involved, he adds the human dimension by calling on the testimony of the people who were there and provides a wealth of fascinating and accessible material: the role of the powerful Saturn V, the reasoning behind the day-to-day concerns of human and spacecraft health between two worlds, the exploration of the lunar surface and the daring involved in traveling to the Moon and the mid-twentieth century. Given the tremendous success of the original *How Apollo Flew to the Moon*, the second edition will have a new chapter on surface activities, inspired by reader's feedback on Amazon.com. There will also be additional detail in the existing chapters to incorporate all the feedback from the original edition and will include larger illustrations.
