Rather than asserting a fixed narrative of American progress, *The American Yawp* gives students a starting point for asking their own questions about how the past informs the problems and opportunities that we confront today.

The new edition of Amy Greenberg's *Manifest Destiny and American Territorial Expansion* continues to emphasize the social and cultural roots of Manifest Destiny when exploring the history of U.S. territorial expansion. Paying attention to key themes often overlooked - Indian removal and the US government land sales policy, the book looks at both 'foreign' expansion such as the Louisiana Purchase in 1803, and the war with Mexico in the 1840s and 'internal' expansion as American settlers moved west. Finally, the book addresses the most recent historiographical trends in the subject and asks how Americans have dealt with the expansionist legacy. Offers new viewpoints on the Turner hypothesis and reappraises the Indian's cultural and economic contributions

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to America's development

"When Thomas Jefferson gave his first inaugural address, he spoke of 'a rising nation, spread over a wide and fruitful land, traversing all the seas ... [and] advancing rapidly beyond the reach of mortal eye.' Little did he realize that he set in motion a series of government policies to expand and defend the frontiers of the United States and these collective policies would later be called Manifest Destiny. Expanding and exploring the frontiers, of the United States, usually involved the Army, and the first expansion west of the Mississippi was done with the Lewis and Clark expedition. From there other military movements occurred, including the Mexican war, and each time the Army enforced the policies of the government. Over time the United States grew larger and the Army pushed further west in attempts to win the continent for the white settlements of America. With the policy of Manifest Destiny the United States government sought possession of the Pacific Northwest. First attempts at expansion were usually made by political and then military forces. Each time the government decided new policies the Army was there to enforce the new decisions. One of the soldiers of Manifest Destiny was Granville Haller who in 1855 led his command into Yakima Indian territory where he was forced to fight a running battle back to his post before the numerically superior tribes surrounded and defeated his small command. He would later return to Yakima country, in a larger expedition in an attempt to subdue the warring tribe, before being ordered to the Puget Sound region and out of contact with the hostile Indians of central and eastern Washington Territory. Another soldier was Edward Steptoe who three years later marched northwards from Fort Walla Walla, to investigate the death of some miners. He was nearly surrounded by a large hostile force and forced to

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fight a retreating battle back to his post. But when another military expedition was mounted to punish the Indians involved Steptoe was not allowed to accompany the force and questions were raised about his usefulness to the military. A comparison of the careers of these two soldiers shall be made since they both commanded similar expeditions and achieved about the same results. Attempts shall be made to find out why Haller's career appears to have been unaffected by his retreat while Steptoe's career was greatly influenced by his retreat."--Document.
