Drawing on photos, anecdotes, and, most important, the way he hears the music, Dyer imaginatively reconstructs scenes from the embattled lives of some of the greats: Lester Young fading away in a hotel room; Charles Mingus storming down the streets of New York on a too-small bicycle; Thelonious Monk creating his own private language on the piano. *In un giorno d'ottobre del 1899, una giovane donna, scrittrice non ancora famosa, arriva a Cagliari, festeggiata ospite della direttrice di una rivista femminile. Nel corso di un blitz durato poche settimane incontra l'uomo della sua vita, lo sposa e con lui si trasferisce a Roma, dove vivrà il resto dei suoi anni. Appena giunta a Cagliari, nessuno sospetta che questa timida ragazza abbia davanti a sé una luminosa carriera letteraria: nel giro di qualche decennio diventerà la prima (e unica) scrittrice italiana a ricevere il Premio Nobel. Così inizia questa biografia di Grazia Deledda, che attraverso la ricerca saggistica e l'evocazione romanzesca trova, tra le pieghe della fitta corrispondenza deleddiana, l'immagine di una donna in continuo movimento tra creazione letteraria, desiderio di autoaffermazione, amori (soprattutto epistolari, ma non per questo meno infelici), tentativi di distacco dalla città dove è nata, Nuoro, e da un ambiente che giudica raggelante e provinciale. Tanti i personaggi che, insieme a lei, incontriamo in queste pagine: da Pirandello, che mostra curiosità nei confronti della scrittrice, a Puccini e alla divina Eleonora Duse, che interpreterà la protagonista di Cenere nell'adattamento cinematografico del romanzo. Diversamente da gran parte dei ritratti biografici della Deledda, dedicati agli anni nuoresi, l'autore si concentra qui sul periodo romano, disegnando la figura di una scrittrice matura e a suo modo integrata nell'ambiente letterario italiano, consapevole del proprio talento e insieme investita dalle ansie e dai dubbi che si accompagnano alla creatività artistica. La vita della Deledda è una storia di determinazione e coraggio; una storia da leggere come un romanzo, per riscoprire la voce di una grande scrittrice, a ottant'anni dalla sua scomparsa.*

In this book Umberto Eco argues that translation is not about comparing two languages, but about the interpretation of a text

in two different languages, thus involving a shift between cultures. An author whose works have appeared in many languages, Eco is also the translator of Gérard de Nerval's *Sylvie* and Raymond Queneau's *Exercices de style* from French into Italian. In *Experiences in Translation* he draws on his substantial practical experience to identify and discuss some central problems of translation. As he convincingly demonstrates, a translation can express an evident deep sense of a text even when violating both lexical and referential faithfulness. Depicting translation as a semiotic task, he uses a wide range of source materials as illustration: the translations of his own and other novels, translations of the dialogue of American films into Italian, and various versions of the Bible. In the second part of his study he deals with translation theories proposed by Jakobson, Steiner, Peirce, and others. Overall, Eco identifies the different types of interpretive acts that count as translation. An enticing new typology emerges, based on his insistence on a common-sense approach and the necessity of taking a critical stance.

This book is unique as no other novel can claim to be: one of 109,027,350,432,000 possible variations of the same work of fiction. Inspired by the legend of Tristan and Isolde, *Tristano* was first published in 1966 in Italian. But only recently has digital technology made it possible to realise the author's original vision. The novel comprises ten chapters, and the fifteen pairs of paragraphs in each of these are shuffled anew for each published copy. No two versions are the same. The random variations between copies enact the variegations of the human heart, as exemplified by the lovers at the centre of the story. The copies of the English translation of *Tristano* are individually numbered, starting from 10,000 (running sequentially from the Italian and German editions). Included is a foreword by Umberto Eco explaining how Balestrini's experiment with the physical medium of the novel demonstrates 'that originality and creativity are nothing more than the chance handling of a combination'.
