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between early jurists and scholars of language out of which the new science of grammar evolved, and makes detailed comparisons between the technical terms of law and grammar to show how the vocabulary of the law was applied

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to the speech of the Arabs. It also sheds light on Sibawayhi's method in producing his magisterial Kitab.

This book serves as the platform to educate people at all levels to understand the fundamentals of

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fiqh processes pertaining especially to the conceptual idea of the globalization of the Mu'amalat fiqh forensic particularly as the guideline for the innovation of various financial products in the Islamic financial

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clarifies many thorny textual puzzles. Perhaps his most interesting argument is that the passage often translated as referring to the "virgins" that are believed to greet the departed faithful in paradise was long ago

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misunderstood. In fact, knowledge of ancient Christian hymns in Aramaic suggests that the word in question refers to "grapes" that the departed will enjoy in a paradisiacal garden. Luxenberg discusses many other similar
