Flaubert at once acknowledged that it was 'a masterpiece that will endure.' Maupassant had used his talents and experiences in the war to create something unique. This decade from 1880 to 1891 was to be the most pivotal of his career. With an audience now made available by the success of 'Boule de Suif' Maupassant organised himself to work methodically

and relentlessly to produce between two and four volumes of work a year. The melding of his talents and business sense and the continual hunger of sources for his works made him wealthy. In his later years he developed a desire for solitude, an obsession for self-preservation, and a fear of death as well as a paranoia of persecution caused by the syphilis he had contracted in his youth. On January 2nd, 1892, Maupassant tried to commit suicide by cutting his throat. Unsuccessful he was

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***committed to the private
asylum of Esprit Blanche at
Passy, in Paris. It was here
on July 6th, 1893 that Henri
René Albert Guy de
Maupassant died at the age
of only 42. We are delighted
to publish this classic book

Edward Bunker's life is
beyond the imaginings of

was born in Hollywood,
California, the son of a
stagehand and Busby
Berkeley chorus girl,
whose early divorce
propelled him into a
series of boarding homes

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and military schools.

repeatedly ran away,
roaming the city streets
at night. A proud
character, combined with
an IQ of 152, resulted
in a series of
altercations with the
authorities. He became
the youngest ever inmate
of San Quentin at the
age of seventeen, and
there he learned
survival skills and
faced down the toughest
prisoners in the system.
He was befriended by Mrs
Louise Wallis, a former

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star of the silent
screen and wife of movie
mogul, Hal Wallis, who
produced films starring
Bogart, Cagney, Edward
G. Robinson and George
Raft. She introduced
Bunker to her circle of
friends, including Jack
Dempsey, Tennessee
Williams, Aldous Huxley
and William Randolph
Hearst, whose guest he
was at San Simeon. A
parole violation
resulted in a spell
crossing America as a
fugitive on the FBI's
most wanted list. His

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eventual capture led to
Folsom prison.

Encouraged by the
example of Dostoevsky,
Cervantes and Caryl
Chessman, and by the
kindness of Mrs Wallis,
he determined to write
his way out of prison.
Bunker's first published
novel, No Beast So
Fierce, viewed by many
including Quentin
Tarantino as the finest
crime novel ever
written, changed his
fortunes. It was filmed
as Straight Time,
starring Dustin Hoffman.

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He has written three other novels, *The Animal Factory*, *Little Boy Blue* and *Dog Eat Dog*, (all published by No Exit) admired by writers as diverse as William Styron and James Ellroy. He received an Oscar nomination for the screenplay of *Runaway Train*, and has appeared in a score of films, most notably his legendary role as Mr Blue in *Reservoir Dogs*. He makes you laugh, though you can never be quite sure why. He's affable enough, of course, but it's not so much that. He is both a kind of halfwit and a genius, flippant and profound, chaotic and yet possessed of a Zen-like calm. He's easily distracted but tends to hound-dog every thought until he has it by the throat. His conversation is labyrinthine but he is capable of moments of blinding lucidity. The thing is, you can't help but love him. He is Vincenzo Malinconico, an underemployed lawyer whose wife has sort of left him (he's the kind of man you

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marry not once but twice, and leave both times), whose teenage children worry him to death, and whose profession mostly consists in appearing as if he has one. In this sequel to *I Hadn't Understood*, a Neapolitan mafia boss has been kidnapped by a mild-mannered computer engineer who holds the camorrista responsible for the accidental death of his son. The engineer plans to conduct an impromptu trial on live television during which he will list the various crimes of the accused, sentencing him before a captivated national audience and executing him accordingly. The standoff between law enforcement officers and the kidnapper becomes a tragi-comic reality show. The only hope of a happy ending rests with Vincenzo Malinconico, Neapolitan lawyer, poster-child for the proverbial mid-life crisis, and inveterate flâneur. He hardly has a reputation for decisiveness, but now

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is called upon to play a decisive role in resolving this drama in course with, hopefully, no loss of life, his own included.

Luigi Pirandello (1867-1936), master of style, appeared first as poet, pure in style, severe in inspiration, but later "found himself" in writing humorous tales, novels and especially dramas. His humor, though at bottom sad and almost pessimistic, is not of a quiet sort. To him man appears as a creature more miserable than grotesque, eternally made sport of by the irony of fate.
