The conclusion focuses on what Behera terms the four P's: parameters, players, politics, and prognosis of the ongoing peace process in Kashmir. Behera also reflects on the devastation of the October 2005 earthquake and its implications for the future of the area. Based on extensive field research and primary sources, *Demystifying Kashmir* breaks new ground by framing the conflict as a political battle of state-making between India and Pakistan rather than as a rigid and ideological Hindu-Muslim conflict. Behera's work will be an essential guide for journalists,

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scholars, activists, policymakers, and anyone interested in how to avert a war between these nuclear powers.

From 22 August, 1937 onwards, it used to published by All India Radio, New Delhi. From 1950, it was turned into a weekly

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journal. Later, The Indian listener became "Akashvani" (English ) w.e.f. January 5, 1958. It was made fortnightly journal again w.e.f July 1,1983.

*In late nineteenth  
century Lucknow, two  
rival story-tellers,  
Syed Muhammad Husain Jah  
and Ahmed Husain Qamar,  
wrote a fantasy in the  
Urdu language whose  
equal had not been heard  
before, and which has  
never been rivalled*

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since. It was called *Tilism-e Hoshruha*. The writers claimed that the tale had been passed down to them from storytellers going back centuries: it was a part of the beloved oral epic, *The Adventures of Amir Hamza* which had come to the Indian subcontinent via Persia and had gained in popularity during the reign of Akbar, the Mughal emperor. The *Tilism-e-Hoshruha* is the subcontinent's first wholly indigenous Indo-

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*Islamic fantasy epic. It tells the stories of Amir Hamza's military forces, his grandson and his loyal band of tricksters (masters of wit and disguise) as they go to war with Afrasiyab, the sorcerer who rules the magical land of Hoshruha. Fantasy, the occult, adventure and romance play themselves out in a typically Indian setting as wizards, sorceresses, tricksters and royalty pitch themselves into the battle for Hoshruha.*

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*The characters of the epic are marvels of literary creation, and are much more colourful and dashing than those of the Amir Hamza cycle of tales. The Tilism-e Hoshruha runs to twenty four volumes and will be translated into English for the first time ever by Musharraf Ali Farooqi, the acclaimed translator of The Adventures of Amir Hamza. Random House India will publish all the volumes starting with Hoshruha: The Land*

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*and the Tilism, i.e. Book 1 of the series. Focusing on the culturally and historically rich Sirai-ki-speaking region, often tagged as 'South Punjab', this book discusses the ways in which Sirai-ki creative writers have transformed into political activists, resisting the self-imposed domination of the Punjabi-Mohajir ruling elite. Influenced by Sufi poets, their poetry takes the shape of both protest and*

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*dialogue. This book reflects upon the politics of identity and the political complications which are a result of colonisation and later, neo-colonisation of Pakistan. It challenges the philosophy of Pakistan – a state created for Muslims – which is now taking the shape of religious fanaticism, while disregarding ethnic and linguistic issues such as that of Siraiki.*
