NOTA INTRODUTTIVA "Si sa di più quando si capisce di più": la conseguenza è che la mente opera ad un livello più alto. Questo libro continua l'analisi della realtà umana con l'obiettivo di contribuire ad una migliore comprensione di quello che siamo. L'autore, Mario Vassalle, di professione è uno scienziato (un elettrofisiologo del cuore) e pertanto la sua mentalità lo porta a cercare la verità nell'analisi dei fatti (come è tipico della scienza). I suoi aforismi, riflessioni e intuizioni contribuiscono risposte specifiche all'insopprimibile desiderio di capire. La lettura dei vari aforismi e pensieri dovrebbe essere separata da pause di riflessione, perché le loro risposte a loro volta propongono nuovi quesiti alla riflessione del lettore. Il risultato generale è che quello che si impara sulla realtà umana porta a una migliore conoscenza e comprensione del proprio Io e della sua realtà, tante volte vissuta senza esserne pienamente consapevoli. Il saggio Luce, colori, ombre e la realtà umana illustra il passaggio dall'analisi alla sintesi, considerando come questi fenomeni contribuiscano alla formazione della realtà umana mediante la loro percezione da parte della mente. Mario Vassalle è nato a Viareggio. Dopo il Liceo Classico, si è laureato in Medicina nel 1953 e specializzato in Cardiologia nel 1955 all'Università di Pisa. Nel 1958 si è trasferito negli Stati Uniti, dove, presso la State University of New York, Downstate Medical Center, si è dedicato come Professore di Fisiologia allo studio sperimentale dei meccanismi che fanno battere il cuore. Ha insegnato a studenti di Medicina e a candidati per il Dottorato di Ricerca (PhD). È ora Professore Emerito. La sua attività di scienziato gli è valsa nel suo campo una reputazione mondiale. Mario Vassalle ha esteso i suoi interessi dalla scienza alla letteratura e alla filosofia pubblicando cinque libri di poesie, undici libri di aforismi e due libri su temi filosofici. Socrates, Or On Human Knowledge, published in Venice in 1651, is the only work written by a Jew that contains so far the promise of a genuinely sceptical investigation into the validity of human certainties. Simone Luzzatto masterly developed this book as a pièce of theatre where Socrates, as main actor, has the task to demonstrate the limits and weaknesses of the human capacity to acquire knowledge without being guided by revelation. He achieved this goal by offering an overview of the various and contradictory gnosiological opinions disseminated since ancient times: the divergence of views, to which he addressed the most attention, prevented him from giving a fixed definition of the nature of the cognitive process. This obliged him to come to the audacious conclusion of neither affirming nor denying anything concerning human knowledge, and finally of suspending his judgement altogether. This work unfortunately had little success in Luzzatto's lifetime, and was subsequently almost forgotten. The absence of substantial evidence from his contemporaries and that of his epistolary have thus increased the difficulty of tracing not only its legacy in the history of philosophical thought, but also of understanding the circumstances surrounding the writing of his Socrates. The present edition will be a preliminary study aiming to shed some light on the philosophical and historical value of this work's translation, indeed it will provide a broader readership with the opportunity to access this immensely complicated work and also to grasp some aspects of the composite intellectual framework and admirable modernity of Venetian Jewish culture in the ghetto.

**Based on three hundred civil and criminal cases over four centuries, Elizabeth W. Mellyn reconstructs the myriad ways families, communities, and civic and medical authorities met in the dynamic arena of Tuscan law courts to forge pragmatic solutions to the problems that madness brought to their households and streets. In some of these cases, solutions were protective and palliative; in others, they were predatory or abusive. The goals of families were sometimes at odds with those of the courts, but for the most part families and judges worked together to order households and communities in ways that served public and private interests. For most of the period Mellyn examines, Tuscan communities had no institutions devoted solely to the treatment and protection of the mentally disturbed; responsibility for their long-term care fell to the family. By the end of the seventeenth century, Tuscans, like other Europeans, had come to explain madness in medical terms and the mentally disordered were beginning to move from households to hospitals. In *Mad Tuscans and Their Families*, Mellyn argues against the commonly held belief that these changes chart the rise of mechanisms of social control by emerging absolutist states. Rather, the story of mental illness is one of false starts, expedients, compromise, and consensus created by a wide range of historical actors.**

This book delineates the attempt, carried out by the Congregations of the Inquisition and the Index during the sixteenth and early seventeenth century, to purge various devotional texts in the Italian vernacular of heterodox beliefs and superstitious elements, while imposing a rigid uniformity in liturgical and devotional practices. The first part of the book is focused on Rome's anxious activity toward the infiltration of Protestant ideas in vernacular treatises on prayer meant for mass consumption. It next explores how, only in the second half of the sixteenth century, once Rome's main preoccupation toward Protestant expansion had subsided, the Church could begin thinking about a move from a rejection of any consideration of the merits of interior prayer to a recovery and acceptance of mental prayer. The final section is dedicated to the primary objective of the Church's actions in purging superstitious practices which was not simply the renewal of the spiritual life of the faithful, but also the control of the religious and social life of many faithful who were uneducated. Based on a careful examination of the archival records of the two Roman dicasteri in question, many of which have only been accessible to scholars since 1998, as well as a close reading of the many of suspect devotional texts themselves, this book offers a fascinating contribution towards a fuller appreciation of the complex landscape that characterized the spiritual realities of early modern Italy.
