

Le Fronde Del Salice Narrativa

Michael Crichton, the #1 New York Times bestselling author of Jurassic Park, returns to the world of paleontology in this recently discovered novel—a thrilling adventure set in the Wild West during the golden age of fossil hunting. The year is 1876. Warring Indian tribes still populate America's western territories even as lawless gold-rush towns begin to mark the landscape. In much of the country it is still illegal to espouse evolution. Against this backdrop two monomaniacal paleontologists pillage the Wild West, hunting for dinosaur fossils, while surveilling, deceiving and sabotaging each other in a rivalry that will come to be known as the Bone Wars. Into this treacherous territory plunges the arrogant and entitled William Johnson, a Yale student with more privilege than sense. Determined to survive a summer in the west to win a bet against his arch-rival, William has joined world-renowned paleontologist Othniel Charles Marsh on his latest expedition. But when the paranoid and secretive Marsh becomes convinced that William is spying for his nemesis, Edwin Drinker Cope, he abandons him in Cheyenne, Wyoming, a locus of crime and vice. William is forced to join forces with Cope and soon stumbles upon a discovery of historic proportions. With this extraordinary treasure, however, comes exceptional danger, and William's newfound resilience will be tested in his struggle to protect his cache, which pits him against some of the West's most notorious characters. A page-turner that draws on both meticulously researched history and an exuberant imagination, Dragon Teeth is based on the rivalry between real-life paleontologists Cope and Marsh; in William Johnson readers will find an inspiring hero only Michael Crichton could have imagined. Perfectly paced and brilliantly plotted, this enormously winning adventure is destined to become another Crichton classic.

Brave New World Revisited

First published in 2003. GABRIELE D'ANNUNZIO was born in 1863 in Pescara, on the Adriatic coast of Italy, the son of a wealthy landowner. His first volume of poetry was published in 1879, when he was sixteen. After graduating from the University of Rome, d'Annunzio married and began to write short stories to support his wife and family. In 1919 d'Annunzio led a small force to seize the town of Fiume, ruling it as a dictator until 1921. D'Annunzio spent the later part of his life at his home on Lake Garda. In 1937 he was made President of the Italian Royal Academy. He died in 1938 and was given a state funeral by Mussolini. When *Halcyon* was first published, at the end of 1903, its author was already forty and famous: *J/ piacere*, which ranks with *A rebours* and *The Picture of Dorian Gray* as a novel of the Decadence, had appeared in 1889, and d'Annunzio had published other novels, short stories, plays, and many volumes of poetry since his first great success at the age of sixteen.

In realtà, a spingerle a fare immediato ritorno a **Barnwell** è il loro fallimento, l'assoluta necessità di allontanarsi da un'esistenza sull'orlo del naufragio. **Rose**, la primogenita, seria e affidabile ricercatrice di matematica, ha raggiunto l'età adulta rigidamente dedita ai propri doveri di figlia e rabbiosamente giudice delle vite delle sorelle assenti. Ma ora ha di fronte una scelta senza ritorno: seguire lontano da **Barnwell** l'uomo che la vuole sposare, o rimanere a coltivare una solitaria carriera universitaria nel paese natale. **Bean** ha placato per anni la propria insicurezza spendendo denaro e seducendo uomini che non amava. Affascinata dalle attrattive della vita a **New York**, si è fatta irretire dalla rincorsa alla ricchezza e all'apparenza, e ora fugge dai suoi imperdonabili errori. **Cordy**, la piccola, bella e libera preferita di papà, dopo anni trascorsi senza una casa, passando da un falso amore all'altro, è incinta senza un compagno e senza sapere dove mettere radici. Ritornate a **Barnwell**, incerte se voler o poter ripartire quanto prima, le tre sorelle si ritrovano a fare i conti con il loro passato e la loro storia presente. The Boy Who Saw with His Hands

Raffaello Borghini's *Il Riposo* (1584) is the most widely known Florentine document on the subject of the Counter-Reformation content of religious paintings. Despite its reputation as an art-historical treatise, it is the first English-language translation of *Il Riposo* to be published. A distillation of the art gossip that was a feature of the Medici Grand Ducal court, Borghini's treatise puts forth simple criteria for the quality of a work of art. Published sixteen years after the second edition of Giorgio Vasari's *Vite*, the text that set the standard for art-historical writing during the period, *Il Riposo* focuses on artists and subjects that Vasari avoided, ignored, or was oblivious to. Picking up where Vasari left off, Borghini deals with artists who came after Michaelangelo and provides more comprehensive descriptions of artists that Vasari only touched upon such as Tintoretto, Veronese, Barocci, and the artists of Francesco I's Studiolo. This text is also invaluable as a description of the mid-sixteenth century reaction against the 'maniera,' which stressed the representation of self-consciously convoluted figures in complicated works of art. The first art treatise specifically directed toward non-practitioners, *Il Riposo* gives us an insight into the early stages of art history as a discipline, late Renaissance art and theory, and the Counter-Reformation in Italy.
