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remote sensing in

aquatic coastal  
environments.

With only limited  
discussion of optics  
and theory  
presented in the  
book, such  
researchers might  
benefit from the  
detailed  
presentations of

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aquatic spectral signatures, and to operational management issues. While not specifically written for remote sensing scientists, it will prove to be a useful reference for this community for the current status of aquatic coastal remote

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sensing.

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Beth and Eric Jusino, laden with backpacks and nerves, walked out of a cathedral in the historic village of Le Puy, France, down a cobblestone street, and turned west. Seventy-nine days, a thousand miles,

revealing memoir

Studio executives wanted well-worn plots, but it was the

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writer's job to develop the innovative situations and scintillating dialogue that would bring to picture to life. For over twenty years, Freddie and her friends struggled to survive in this incredibly competitive environment. Through it all, Freddie remained a

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passionate,

outspoken woman in  
an industry run by  
powerful men, and  
her provocative,  
nonconformist ways  
brought her success,  
failure, wisdom, and a  
wealth of stories,
