On September 11, 1999, eight oil workers—seven Canadians and one American—in Ecuador on a routine mission to repair a stretch of corroded pipe for United Pipeline Systems were taken hostage by fifteen armed guerrillas. One hundred days later they finally emerged from the bush, emaciated and feverish. First published in 2000, *100 Days in the Jungle* is now reissued with a new epilogue that tracks the fate of the eight kidnapped men and their captors. This success, combined with his warming relations with Nikita Khrushchev in the wake of the Cuban missile crisis, led to a détente that British foreign secretary Sir Alec Douglas- Home hailed as the "beginning of the end of the Cold War." Throughout his presidency, Kennedy challenged demands from his advisers and the Pentagon to escalate America's involvement in Vietnam. Kennedy began a reappraisal in the last hundred days that would have led to the withdrawal of all sixteen thousand U.S. military advisers by 1965.
