This is of concern because of the high prevalence of alcohol problems in the general population.^{1,2} For example, data show that an estimated 10 percent to 20 percent of patients seen in primary care or hospital settings have a diagnosable alcohol use disorder.^{3,4} People who engage in risky drinking often have physical and social problems related to their alcohol use.
