*This key resource is often referred to as the "Green Book". Federal policymakers and program managers are continually seeking ways to better achieve agencies' missions and program results, in other words, they are seeking ways to improve accountability. A key factor in helping achieve such outcomes and minimize operational problems is to implement appropriate internal control. Effective internal control also helps in managing change to cope with shifting environments and evolving demands and priorities. As programs change and as agencies strive to improve operational processes and implement new technological developments, management must continually assess and evaluate its internal control to assure that the control activities being used are effective and updated when necessary. The Federal Managers' Financial Integrity Act of 1982 (FMFIA) requires the General Accounting Office (GAO) to issue standards for internal control in government. The standards provide the overall framework for establishing and maintaining internal control and for identifying and addressing major performance and management challenges, and areas at greatest risk of fraud, waste, abuse and mismanagement. However, they are not intended to limit or interfere with duly granted authority related to developing legislation, rule-making, or other discretionary policy-making in an agency. These standards provide a general framework. In implementing these standards, management is responsible for developing the detailed policies, procedures, and practices to fit their agency's operations and to ensure that they are built into and an integral part of operations. The CFPB's operations are funded principally by transfers made by the Board of Governors of the Federal Reserve System from the combined earnings of the Federal Reserve System, up to the limits set forth in the Dodd-Frank Act. The Director of the CFPB requests transfers from the Federal Reserve System in amounts that he has determined are reasonably necessary to carry out the Bureau's mission without exceeding the limits in the Dodd-Frank Act. Transfers through FY 2013 are capped at set percentages of the total 2009 operating expenses of the Federal Reserve System. In fiscal years 2014 and beyond, the cap is adjusted annually based on the percentage increase in the employment cost index for the total compensation for State and local government workers published by the Federal Government. Transfers from the Federal Reserve System are capped at \$608.4 million for FY 2014. For FY 2015, the funding cap is currently estimated to be \$618.7 million. Funds transferred from the Federal Reserve System are deposited into the Bureau of Consumer Financial Protection Fund (Bureau Fund), which is maintained at the Federal Reserve Bank of New York.

The book addresses this point by providing an account of the terrain of theoretical debate alongside salient themes in public policy.

The federal government is expected to provide state and local governments more than \$607 billion in federal grants in FY2015. These grants fund a wide range of public policies, such as health care, transportation, income security, education, job training, social services, economic development, and environmental protection. Federal grants account for about one-third of total state government funding, and more than half of state government funding for health care and public assistance.

The Oxford Handbook of State and Local Government covers the main areas of study in subnational politics by exploring the contributions to the comparative study of institutions, behaviour, and policy in the American context.

One-in-seven adults and one-in-five children in the United States live in poverty. Individuals and families living in poverty do not lack basic, material necessities, but they are also disproportionately afflicted by many social and economic challenges. Some of these challenges include the increased possibility of an unstable home situation, inadequate education opportunities at all levels, and a higher chance of crime and victimization. Given this growing social, economic, and political concern, The Hamilton Project at Brookings asked academic experts to develop policy proposals confronting the various challenges of America's poorest citizens, and to identify innovative approaches to addressing poverty. When combined, the scope and impact of these proposals has the potential to significantly improve the lives of the poor. The resulting 14 policy memos are included in The Hamilton Project's Policies to Address Poverty in America. **In 2014, the federal government provided about \$50 billion in housing assistance specifically designated for low-income households. That assistance--which is made available both through spending programs and preferential tax treatment--increased by about 15 percent in real (inflation-adjusted) terms between 2000 and 2003. Since that time, such assistance has remained relatively stable at about \$50 billion annually (measured in 2014 dollars), with the exception of a temporary boost, mostly in 2010 and 2011, associated with the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 (ARRA).
