There is plenty of detail about less well-known genealogy sources such as records relating to re-interment, undertakers' and stonemasons' records, together with better known sources such as burial registers and memorial inscriptions. Throughout, there is a wide range of hands-on case studies which bring the subject to life and put it right into the hands of the researcher. This is far more than just genealogy, and Celia portrays this fascinating subject from the view of both historian and
