Grafting and Budding: A Practical Guide for Fruit and Nut Plants and Ornamentals is an updated and expanded version of **Grafting and Budding Fruit and Nut Trees** and now includes the grafting of ornamental plants. More than 60 sketches and photographs are included to help illustrate various aspects of the skill of grafting. New to this edition are sections covering the preferred methods of propagation for Australian natives such as eucalypts, banksias, hakeas and grevilleas; cacti; conifers; general deciduous ornamentals; black passionfruits; pears and tomatoes, making it an indispensable addition to any avid gardener's bookshelf.
