***Greco-Roman antiquity is often presumed to provide the very paradigm of Western humanist thinking - a paradigm that is increasingly becoming dislodged by new theoretical currents in the humanities such as posthumanism and the "new materialisms", which point toward entities, forces, and systems that pass through and beyond the human, and***

**which remove it from its primacy as the measure of things. Antiquities Beyond Humanism seeks to explode this presumed dichotomy between the ancient tradition and the modern "turn": fourteen original essays explore instead the myriad ways in which Greek and Roman philosophy and literature can be understood as foregrounding the non-human rather than simply reflecting the ideals of classical humanism. 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**can forge new understandings  
of life, whether understood as  
zoological, psychical, ethical,  
juridical, political, theological,  
or cosmic.**

We hear about inadequate  
mental health care. We ask  
questions regarding a link  
between mental illness and  
violence. We do NOT hear as  
much about the stigma of  
mental illness that  
complicates one's ability to  
cope with a diagnosis that  
becomes a label, resulting  
in "self-  
stigma,"discouraging

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individuals from seeking  
and/or complying with  
treatment. Too often  
community members only  
"experience" mental illness  
through dramatic or dire  
media stories that fail to  
inform us about the real  
world of mental illness.  
Thus, stigma feeds, and is  
fed by, myths and  
misunderstandings leading to  
a community sense of  
hopelessness and fear of  
mental illness. In contrast,  
Geel, a stigma-free  
community in Belgium, has a
