Now she heard the set "The Owl' on her trail. No matter to her because she had the intelligence and skill to outwit even their most willy investigator. She was Ella Covington, the burglar called, "The Pussycat.' She would not be caught. The Pussycat was just another robber who would inevitably show their hand when over confidence came into play. A female burglar intrigued him especially when he uncovered her true identity. Alas, there were bigger players on the board, and he grew impatient for his prize The growing attraction for the woman whose motivation eluded
