Narratology has been conceived from its earliest days as a project that transcends disciplines and media. The essays gathered here address the question of how narrative

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migrates,  
mutates, and  
creates meaning  
as it is  
expressed across

pictures, moving  
pictures, music,  
and digital

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media, Narrative

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the possible. In her book, Meretoja develops a hermeneutic narrative ethics that differentiates between six dimensions of the ethical potential of storytelling: the power of

understanding;  
to enable unders  
tanding other  
lives non-  
subsumptively in  
their  
singularity; to
