The arduous labors of Professor and Mrs. Wallace in the manuscript archives of England, during the course of which they examined over a million documents, recently yielded some fresh information; yet the small number of their finds assures us that nearly all that we are likely to know of the personal affairs of the great dramatist has already been made public.
